The Upgraded Round Market & Food Centre

The iconic circular market and food centre at Block 137 Tampines Street 11 was officially re-opened on 7 July 2019 after two months of renovation work and enhancements.

The Mayor of North East District and MP for Tampines GRC, Mr Desmond Choo, highlighted that the 36-year-old market and food centre is more than just a place to enjoy good food. "Many of our residents, whether they are living in Tampines or have moved away, continue to come back to our round market and food centre not only to enjoy the food but also to meet up with old friends," Mr Choo said during his opening address. "It is an important node - a community space where Tampines residents can meet and mingle."

After his opening address, Mr Choo joined Mr Heng Swee Keat, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance, and Mr Masagos Zulkifli, Minister for the Environment and Water Resources and Minister-in-charge of Muslim Affairs, in unveiling a plaque commemorating the occasion.

An Eco-Friendly Butterfly Paradise

A rejuvenated Tampines Changkat Butterfly Garden welcomed visitors during its reopening ceremony on 14 September. Located beside Block 124 Tampines Street 11, this garden is home to more than eight species of butterflies.

The Mayor of North East District and MP for Tampines GRC, Mr Desmond Choo, together with Ms Irene Ng (former MP for Tampines GRC) and other grassroots leaders unveiled the plaque and released butterflies to commemorate the reopening. "The garden that Ms Irene Ng conceptualised had a vision behind it. The vision is about connecting residents with nature, providing a community space in which everyone can mingle and enjoy nature. It is a garden that unifies the community here, as well as a place for future generations to learn more about biodiversity," Mr Choo said.

The butterfly garden is bigger, now covering more than 200sqm compared to 120sqm previously, and includes a community plaza for residents to participate in activities like yoga and qigong among the flitting butterflies.

Towards a Smart Nation: Digital Display Panels

Residents are getting information and news from digital screens in lifts, as part of the Republic's Smart Nation drive to leverage digital technologies. This project is sustained by Target Media and is at no cost to Tampines Town Council.

The panels complement our traditional noticeboards, which have limited space and require notices to be replaced when their content becomes outdated. The digital display panels offer a rolling display of news and information from community organisations, government agencies and advertisers.

Residents get updates from content ranging from notices on activities in the estate to nationwide updates on emergencies and public health advisories.

Commercial advertisements can also be displayed, but these will be limited to 30 per cent of the total screen time. To support better engagement for community organisations and brand partners, Target Media is taking on the setup and upkeep of the digital screens.



Learning Best at the Learning Fest!



Tampines Learning Festival returns for yet another year! This annual festival encourages cross-skill learning in children and offers a supersized variety of fun for the little ones and their families. Mind-bending quizzes, mini bowling, bouncy castles, and murder mysteries were just some of the activities available at the Tampines Community Plaza festival grounds. The festival also incorporated a Singapore Bicentennial theme.



Ms Cheng said, "Children's performances always make us smile. They have so much energy and innocence. The Learning Festival is a good platform for children to have public performances."



Mr Heng Swee Keat, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance, Mr Masagos Zulkifli, Minister for the Environment and

Water Resources and Minister-in-charge of Muslim Affairs, Mr Desmond Choo, Mayor of North East District, Mr Baey Yam Keng, Senior Parliamentary Secretary for Culture, Community & Youth and Transport, and Ms Cheng Li Hui, Chairman of Tampines Town Council officiated the event. They toured the festival grounds and took group photos with event performers, some of whom were children enrolled in preschools and childcare centres all across Tampines.

Mr Sudirman, 39, a teacher from Junyuan Primary School, revealed that much planning went into choreographing his students' dance performance to incorporate the Bicentennial theme. "Our students have also overcome stage fright and have become more confident through the stage performances," he added.

Project 100=50 offers low- and middle-income families an opportunity to purchase daily necessities at subsidised rates. The project was launched on 24 August at the Arena @ Our Tampines Hub by Mr Heng Swee Keat, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance, Mr Desmond Choo, Mayor of North East District, Mr Baey Yam Keng, Senior Parliamentary Secretary for Culture, Community & Youth and Transport, and Ms Cheng Li Hui, Chairman of Tampines Town Council.

The subsidies apply to 330 different grocery items, including canned food, frozen food, rice, oil, laundry supplies and personal care items. The discounts are capped at 50 per cent of the total bill, or \$50 - whichever is lower. Five hundred families received assistance from the project, which was organised by Sheng Shiong Supermarket and Heartwarmers Volunteer Group.

"We want to help low- and middle-income residents cope with the cost of living. Residents can get things that they need at below the usual supermarket prices. This will allow them to save on cost, as well as reduce wastage," Mr Choo explained.

Kamariah, 59, said, "My sister is living alone. Her legs are not so good, so she cannot work. This programme can help her save significantly."

A big thank you to our volunteers, grassroots leaders and community partners for making Project 100=50 a success. Tampines will continue to work on similar projects to build a caring and inclusive society.

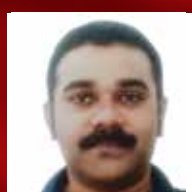

Say Yes ... to Neighbourhood Renewal Programme!



Tampines Sunrise (Blocks 701-711), Tampines Starlight (Blocks 712-723) and Tampines Courtview (Blocks 724-734) along Street 71 and 72 will undergo a facelift under the Tampines Central Neighbourhood Renewal Programme (NRP).



"The whole NRP will cost about \$15 million. This will be an even nicer neighbourhood with more trees and plants," Deputy Prime Minister, Minister for Finance and MP for Tampines

GRC, Mr Heng Swee Keat announced on 21 September, at the NRP Consensus Gathering Batch 11 event.

Residents can look forward to new linkways, drop-off porches, precinct gardens, playgrounds, park shelters, fitness areas, and upgraded senior citizens' corners. Block-level upgrades include facelifts for void deck furniture, letterboxes and bicycle racks.

Mr Loo Chew Ming, 40, welcomed the building of the covered linkway connecting Poi Ching Primary School and Block 707. "I will no longer need to bring umbrella when I fetch my son, who is a student there," he said enthusiastically.

More than 75 per cent of the residents voted "yes", and this means that their wish lists will soon become a reality!

No More Crying Fowl

Did you know the feeding and rearing of chickens is considered to be animal cruelty?

Tampines East and Tampines Changkat residents would have seen our feathered friends in the estate the past few months. These free-ranging chickens were often seen with their young, feeding on the leftover food scattered across the ground.

Unknown to many, human food which contains oil, sugar and salt may affect our feathered friends' health negatively. The leftover food also attracts pests and creates hygiene problems.

Also, rearing these chickens at home will not benefit the animals, as keeping them in small cages prevents them from roaming freely. HDB apartments can never be the best homes for them.

Animal Concerns Research and Education Society (ACRES) shared useful information during two engagement sessions held with Tampines residents. ACRES also reassured our residents that the chickens in Tampines East and Tampines Changkat were rehomed to a suitable environment and were not culled. ACRES also evaluates the new environments and living conditions before sending the chickens there. Animal lovers can have peace of mind knowing that ACRES has the chickens' best interest at heart.

While these chickens bring back memories of the good old kampong days, the right way to love them is by giving them a more suitable home.

Growing Our Green Future with 100 Fruit Trees



100 trees that will bear fruits were planted by our five MPs for Tampines GRC along with over 1,000 residents at Sun Plaza Park on the morning of 26 October 2019, as part of the annual tree planting carnival.

"The tree planting campaign was launched in 1963 by founding Prime Minister Mr Lee Kuan Yew. Today's tree planting ceremony has added significance because of climate change. Climate change affects every Singaporean and is an issue many of us are concerned about. After all, future generations will bear the consequences of our actions today," said Ms Cheng Li Hui, Chairman of Tampines Town Council.

Akin to an orchard within the park, a plethora of fruit tree species, such as Kedondong, Langsat, Terap, Longan and Rambutan were planted. Ms Cheng added that consolidating these fruit trees within a single plot of land makes it easier to maintain them and harvest the fruits.

A series of eco-seminars and workshops that drove home the importance of eco-consciousness and sustainable lifestyles served to educate residents on eco-friendly practices. This included useful tips on growing nutritious microgreens, leading a zero-waste lifestyle and even cultivating Phalaenopsis orchids at home!

Mr Partha, 39, a resident who accompanied his son to plant trees, commented, "Raising awareness of eco-consciousness is crucial, especially as we are now in the midst of global warming."

Young children were awed by ethereal bubble shows and whimsical magic performances. The National Environment Agency also put up a humorous "Towards Zero Waste" skit that drew chuckles from the residents while showing how they can use less plastic in their daily lives.



Ride it Right with your PMDs

The riding of personal mobility devices (PMDs) was banned at void decks and common property from 1 September 2019. The ban includes e-scooters, skateboards and bicycles, all of which must be dismounted from and pushed in the common property managed by town councils. PMD riders who violate the rules will be penalised under Town Council's (Common Property and Open Spaces) By-laws. Offenders may be fined up to S\$5,000 upon conviction.

Ban of e-scooters and PABs on footpaths by LTA

To further safeguard the safety of our pedestrians, Land Transport Authority (LTA) banned all e-scooters and PABs (power-assisted bicycles) on footpaths on 5 November 2019. With the ban, e-scooter and PAB riders can only ride on shared paths (cycling paths and park connector network). Offenders face fines of up to \$2,000 and jail time of up to three months once the ban is strictly enforced starting in 2020.

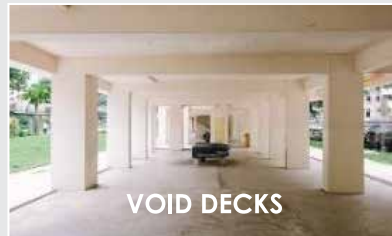

Good news for Tampines residents!

The cycling path network in Tampines will be tripled from 6.9km to about 21km, as part of plans to transform the estate into a walking and cycling town by 2022.



About your S&CC Rebate

The Service & Conservancy Charges (S&CC) rebate was announced during Budget 2019 to help households better budget their expenses. As reported, 930,000 HDB households will receive \$132m in S&CC rebates. Depending on the HDB flat type, each eligible Singaporean household will receive a rebate amounting to 1.5 to 3.5 months of S&CC fees. Residents received rebates in April 2019, July 2019, October 2019 and some will receive another rebate in January 2020.

Did you know that the S&CC rebate has been paid out annually by the Government since 2013? It will be used to offset a household's S&CC payment directly. For households who pay their S&CC through GIRO, the Town Council will make the necessary arrangement with their banks. What She Wanted: To Return to the Workforce

Ms Lim Luck Cher left her job after 26 years in manufacturing to care for her elderly mother. However, after three years of unemployment, she decided it was time to re-enter the job market in a new industry to pick up new skills, but met with roadblocks. "Though I had sent out many applications, I didn't get much response," she said.

Her sister then told her about Careers Connect at Our Tampines Hub. She says, "There, I was matched with a career coach who shared information about different jobs that I could explore and the industries I could consider entering."

Retail was one of these industries as she wanted a people-facing role. "My coach suggested that I join the learning journey at Giant Singapore," she recalls. "The learning journey let me shadow existing staff and allowed me to see for myself what I needed to do if I joined full-time."

After speaking to team members, Ms Lim grew confident of her ability to do the job, despite having no experience in sales or retail. And thankfully, she gave it a try because she soon got a position as a sales assistant at the hypermarket in Tampines.

"I'm glad I managed to find a job near my home!"



What He Wanted: To Enter a New Industry

It isn't easy switching careers, especially when you've been in the same job for years. But for Mr Mohammed Samsi Bin Nawawi, he knew it was important to take on something new. He decided to take a different career path after 10 years in the police force. He shares, "I wanted to challenge myself, push out of my comfort zone and see how far I could grow."

At the time, the construction industry was booming and he wanted to get into it. "I was interested in the safety aspects," he says. But Mr Samsi knew that being less experienced would make him vulnerable. As such, he attended safety courses to upgrade his skills. "That was where I met my career coach." She often called to check on his job search and gave additional interview tips. These follow-ups comforted him because he felt someone was helping him re-enter the workforce.

With the help received, Mr Samsi soon received a job offer as a Safety Officer at a Singapore-based construction company. "Meeting my coach was timely and her calls gave me the push to update her with positive news. I have my wife to thank for persuading me to get help with my job search," he reveals. "If I hadn't, my job search would probably have been slower."






Tampines Town Council 2019 Photo Contest - Winning Entries




